# OUR YEAR AT WORCESTER COMMUNITY TRUST

## **Our Community Hubs**

At Worcester Community Trust we manage six community hubs across some of the most vibrant neighbourhoods in Worcester; neighbourhoods which face some of the greatest consequences of inequality and where the consequences of inflation and rise in the cost of living has an increased effect.

Community work is at the core of what we do by people who know how to build relationships and develop trust, by people who understand firsthand the challenges, but also the possibilities, capabilities and opportunities within these neighbourhoods.

# Through a snapshot of our hubs, we estimate over 60,000 people per year pass through the hubs.

In 2024 the community hubs cost £510k to run, this will rise to over £620k in the next 3 years.

In 2022/23, WCT generated 69% of it's hub running costs. In 2023/24 this increased to 95%.

We have over 250 organisations, groups and individuals offering training, social activity, healthcare, spiritual enrichment and more.


Our aim is not to hire the hubs to just anyone. We work with and encourage organisations and individuals that are invested in our goal; to enable positive transformation in people's lives and the communities we are in.



We receive much needed support from Worcester City Council in managing these hubs through a management grant of £15k per hub and through support in maintaining the buildings.

By 2027/28 WCT will become 100% responsible for our hub maintenance costs, and with less stability in local authority funding and significant increases of costs, we are always considering ways to improve our financial resilience and make sure we are protecting the community use of these assets into the future.

# Young People's Services



We ran a weekly program of seven youth clubs for young people aged 8 to 17. Supported by Worcester Municipal Charities, Worcestershire County Council, Lasletts and The National Lottery Community via a Young Solutions Partnership.

#### 574 individual Young People were reached

In September 2023 we adjusted our youth program to run from 3 catchments: West (Dines Green), East (Brickfields) and Central for Asian Heritage Communities (Horizon).

This has been a contentious but necessary strategy due to a near halving of key funding.

In June WCT formed a partnership with PYPLC, YMCA, Onside, Vesta Tilley (via Bromsgrove Hub)

and was successful in obtaining a 5 year contract from Worcestershire County Council.

This started delivery in Sept 2023.

# The DAWN Project

Supported by Public Health Worcestershire, Police Chief Crime Commissioner, South Worcestershire Community Safety Partnership and Garfield Weston Foundation.



DAWN is a free, confidential, non-judgemental support service for any individual who lives in Wychavon, Malvern Hills and Worcester City and is experiencing, or has experienced, domestic abuse.

#### 296 people experiencing Domestic Abuse were supported

DAWN received 369 referrals between April 2023 and March 2024, despite the waiting list being closed for over 10 weeks during this period.

196 individuals left their abusive relationship long term (over 6 months)

449 children are living safer lives due to targeted intervention from DAWN with 33 children being stepped down from Child Protection or Child in Need plans

DAWN has seen a 150% increase in Male victim/survivors seeking support from the service in the last year.

82 Domestic Abuse Champions were recruited increasing awareness of indicators and available services within communities.

The Champions Project has champions accessing or from Ethnic minority Groups, LGBT, Young people, male, mental health, elderly, survivor, Gypsy Roma Travellers, homeless, substance misuse, Christian and immigrant communities.



# Skills and Training

### **Building Block**

The Building Block was set up in 2015 to support the development of practical skills and support people's journey towards careers in the construction sector.

After 8 years of in-house delivery, WCT formed a partnership with specialist training provider GLP. The aim was to bring the private, public and community sectors together to deliver on the ambitious townsfund targets of bringing improved economic opportunities to people in the city with the least educational attainment.

Building Block saw 125 people access training through this facility and reached 1450 hours of volunteering

### **Virtual College**

Virtual College is WCT's online platform that enables people to get necessary accredited, professional qualifications such as Health and Safety, Food Hygiene, Safeguarding, GDPR etc. We offer this as part of our wider programmes for free to staff and the people we work with to enable them to improve their confidence, skills and economic opportunities.

113 people we work with accessed accredited training this year.

75% of clients reported an increase in levels of confidence

32 people moved into employment

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24 people moved into a job search



#### Asset-based community development (ABCD)

is an approach to community development that focuses on identifying and building on a community's strengths, interests, capabilities and assets to create sustainable and positive change. It is hyper local and long term work.

WCT acquired support via the WCC UK Shared Prosperity Fund to have a community builder based at Dines Green and Warndon. Having accessible community engagement workers is key to enlivening the hubs.

Along with 100s of conversations and multiple community meetings, the successes this year have been moving the Community Fridge and Pantry from being WCT-led to being a locally led project, that is run by residents and focused on waste collection from supermarkets.

Our Dines Green community builder also instigated an event that celebrated 70 years of Dines Green, 'Dines Fest'. Over the year a group of local volunteers were established and the project was held independently by this group and grew to gain partnership from Honeywell School where the event was held.

# Investing in our community buildings



This year has seen the implementation of a £1.6m investment in spaces for Skills and Training spaces at the hubs.

The aim of the project is to see an increase of over 1000 people accessing skills and training in their local community each year.

The delivery of this won't take place until Summer 24, but much of the contracting, consultation and design work took place this year.



#### **Environmental Improvements**

To make our buildings more environmentally friendly, they will need serious investment. It is likely to be in the £millions. We are approaching this proactively and see this as an opportunity to have highly efficient examples of new technologies in the heart of our communities.

In 2023/24, we accessed funding to undertake a range of energy and carbon audits on our buildings. These reports will enable us to apply for grants in future years. We will work closely with Worcester City Council to make sure this is as effective as possible.

We see the capital improvements as the way of having the most impact in carbon reduction with the available resources and capacity available to us. A proposed project of Solar, Storage, LED lights and Air Source Heat Pumps has an estimated reduction of 350 tonnes of carbon over 25 years.

#### **Beryl Bikes and Bike Worcester**

We have championed the case for having the Beryl shared bike scheme close to our hubs to make sure this is a shared resource within all communities in the city. Bike Worcester, who promote safe and accessible cycling in Worcester, aim to have a Bike Bus to every primary school by 2025 and have worked with WCT via it's Bike Recycling scheme.



#### Movement to refurbished IT equipment

We have worked with local companies to get donations of IT equipment that we are refurbishing both for staff and for people we work with. We also source our phones from a company that offer refurbished devices and also plants a tree with every purchase.

We will work with the staff team, local communities and partner organisations to understand what else we can implement to help make our operations as environmentally sustainable as we can.
